- 2. There will be a Public Hearing on Thursday at 6:45 pm on proposed Local Law No. 3 of 2018 Temporary Weight Limits on Town Roads
- 3. Discussions will be held on Thursday regarding the sidewalks in Preston Hollow.
- 4. Supervisor Pfleging announced that no one had come forward to apply for the Planning/Zoning Board Clerk position. Another advertisement will need to be placed in the newspaper. The Town may have to reach out to neighboring Towns.
- 5. Weston & Sampson Engineering is drafting a letter which will be submitted to the Department of Environmental Conservation following its approval by the Town Board. They would also like to locate the end of the pipe in the lake so that when the diver and the CCTVs are on site, the pipe can be plugged in a timely fashion.

The pool area downstream must be drained prior to the CCTV work. The Highway Department may be able to assist in this process. The Board also inquired as to whether or not the Huyck Preserve would be interested in assisting in some capacity as well.

NEW BUSINESS

- 1. The Highway's on-line bidding authority will need to be renewed on Thursday.
- 2. Supervisor Pfleging announced that during a PERMA conference he learned that the Town will be mandated to provide cancer coverage through NYS Worker's Compensation for members of the Town's fire companies. It is called the New York State Firefighter Cancer Benefit Program and will commence on January 1, 2019. The volunteer would have had to serve at least 5 years as an *interior firefighter* and must still be an active member, whether or not the individual is an interior firefighter at the present time. *[Editor's Note:* The full text of the law can be found at: https://www.nysenate.gov/legislation/bills/2017/s1411/amendment/b. - 3. The Board will discuss the mowing of the parks with the attorney on Thursday.
- 4. The Board will need to accept the resignation of Deputy Water/Sewer Treatment Officer, Gerritt Platel.

The Town Board of the Town of Rensselaerville held a Public Hearing on the 14th day of June 2018 at 6:45 in the evening at the Rensselaerville Town Hall, 87 Barger Road, Medusa, NY. The meeting was convened by Supervisor Pfleging and the roll was called with the following results:

The purpose of the Public Hearing was to receive public comment on proposed Local Law No. 3 of 2018 – Imposing Temporary Weight Restrictions for Certain Vehicles Traveling on Town Highways.

A motion was made by Councilman Rauf to open the Public Hearing at 6:45 pm; 2nd by Councilman Dolce. *Motion carried: Ayes (5) Pfleging, Cooke, Dolce, Rauf, and Sedlmeir; Nays (0)*

The proposed Local Law reads as follows:

PROPOSED LOCAL LAW NO. 3 OF 2018 TOWN OF RENSSELAERVILLE, NEW YORK

A local law to permit the imposition of temporarily weight restrictions for vehicles traveling on Town highways:

Section 1: Vehicles with a gross weight of six (6) tons or more are temporarily excluded from Town highways and during any schedule as determined by the Highway Superintendent based upon a determination that any such highway would be materially injured by the operation of any such vehicle thereon. The Highway Superintendent shall inform the Town Clerk and Town Board of any such determination. Such exclusion shall take effect upon the erection of signs on the section of highway from which such vehicles are excluded, and a notice that such vehicles are excluded shall be published in the official newspaper of the Town of Rensselaerville. The exclusion shall remain in effect until the removal of the signs, as directed by the Highway Superintendent or the Town Board.

Section 2: Upon written application by any operator of a vehicle subject to the restrictions of this section, the Highway Superintendent may issue a permit providing an appropriate exemption to such vehicle from any exclusions authorized above, upon a determination that said vehicle is performing essential local pickup or delivery service, or services related to maintenance, repair or installation of public improvements, and that failure to grant such permit would create a hardship. Every such permit may designate the route to be traversed and contain other reasonable restrictions or conditions deemed necessary. Every such permit shall be carried on the vehicle to which it refers and shall be open to inspection of any peace officer, police officer or town highway department officer. Such permits shall be limited to the time periods of the restrictions imposed under this section by the superintendent.

Section 3: The Town Board hereby delegates to the Highway Superintendent, pursuant to Vehicle and Traffic Law Section 1603(c), the authority set forth in Section 1 and 2, herein.

<u>Section 4</u>: In addition to injunctive and other relief, violators may be fined up to \$500 for each and every separate violation of the provisions of this law.

<u>Section 5</u>: This Local Law shall not apply to any fire or emergency vehicles, school busses owned by or under contract to a school district or school approved by the State Department of Education.

<u>Section 6</u>: The Highway Superintendent is responsible for erecting weight limit signs on town highways or section of highways from which overweight vehicles are excluded pursuant to this Local Law.

Section 7: If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part of this local law shall be adjudged by

any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered.

Section 8: To the extent that this local law may be found to be inconsistent with any provision of the New York State Town Law, or any special law, the Town Board declares that it is its intent that this local law shall supersede any such inconsistent provision in order to effectuate the purposes of this local law.

<u>Section 9</u>: This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon its filing with the Office of the Secretary of State.

Marie Dermody, referring to Section 4, questioned who decides what the fine is actually going to be. The answer being that the Court would decide the fine.

Also, there was a typographical error in Section 8; "superseded" should read "supersede".

As no other comments were introduced, neither verbal nor written, Supervisor Pfleging entertained a motion to close the Public Hearing.

MICHAEL SIKULE ON BEHALF OF CATHOLIC CHARITIES

Michael Sikule, who serves on the Tri-County Services/Catholic Charities Board wished to make citizens aware of all the services which Catholic Charities provides. Catholic Charities/Tri-County Services operates 5 food and outreach centers in the Capital District area; the Hilltowns Community Resource Center is one of them. The Hilltowns Community Resource Center, located in Westerlo and run by Marybeth Peterson and assistant Misty Schafer, has served the communities of Berne, Knox, Westerlo, and Rensselaerville since 1981 and currently serves over 550 families in the Hilltowns. The Resource Center provides information, referral, advocacy and case management services; food pantry; Holiday assistance providing food, clothing, and toys for children and families at Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas; back-to-school projects that include clothing and school supplies; emergency assistance to individuals and families experiencing a crisis; and is a satellite office for Albany County Food Stamps in-take. The Resource Center also does luncheons for the "shut-ins" in the winter.

Catholic Charities know that people's struggles are real and hunger is most often a symptom of a larger issue such as no transportation to get to work, a past due heating bill, or needing back-to-school clothes for growing children. It is their goal to see that no person goes hungry with a larger hope to strengthen their lives and our communities.

RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN OF RENSSELAERVILLE **TOWN BOARD**

WHEREAS, the Town Board has been advised that certain Town Highways suffer damage by the operation of certain trucks and similar vehicles of heavy weight during the thawing season and at other times of the year; and

WHEREAS, the Town, pursuant to Section 130(7) of the Town Law and Sections 1603(e) and 1660(a) (11) of the Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York, may enact a local law temporarily restricting the weight of vehicles traveling on Town Highways; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the duly convened Town Board of the Town of Rensselaer-ville, that the attached Local Law No. 3 of 2018, which is incorporated herein, be and hereby is enacted.

By motion made by Marion Cooke and seconded by Margaret Sedlmeir, the foregoing resolution was adopted by a majority of the members of the Town Board of the Town of Rensselaerville on the 14th day of June 2018 as follows:

3. Councilman Rauf noted that it was brought to his attention that the motion he made at the Regular Meeting in May regarding the revamping of the sidewalks in Preston Hollow lacked some specificity. He wished to note that the \$12,000 did not include labor cost which Superintendent Bates estimated would be about \$7,500.

A motion was made by Councilman Rauf to rescind the motion to authorize the Highway Department to perform the repairs on the sidewalk with a budget not to exceed \$12,000. The motion was seconded by Councilwoman Cooke.

A motion was made by Councilman Rauf to authorize the Highway Department to repair the existing sidewalk from the Tri-Village Fire Company to the end of Brookside cemetery along State Route 145. The sidewalk shall be repaired and repaved to the standards of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and also to the specifications of the Highway Superintendent. The cost of materials shall not exceed \$12,000. The motion was seconded by Councilman Dolce.

Motion carried: Ayes (5) Pfleging, Cooke, Dolce, Rauf, and Sedlmeir; Nays (0)

- 4. Supervisor Pfleging announced that thus far no letters of interest in the Planning Board/Zoning Board Clerk position had been received. Supervisor Pfleging will reach out to Debra Baxter, who currently serves as the Assessor's Clerk and the Code Enforcement/Building Inspector's Clerk. In the alternative, he will reach out to neighboring towns for assistance with the search.
- 5. Weston & Sampson Engineering is drafting a letter which will be submitted to the Department of Environmental Conservation following its approval by the Town Board. They would also like to locate the end of the pipe in the lake so that when the diver and the CCTVs are on site, the pipe can be plugged in a timely fashion.

The pool area will need to be drained prior to the CCTV work as well. Superintendent Bates noted that the beaver dam is abandoned and must be removed as a matter of maintenance. A permit from the Department of Environmental Conservation will be needed to bring in a small excavator via County Route 353 to perform the work. Supervisor Pfleging has been in contact with Adam Caprio from the Huyck Preserve in an effort to see if the Preserve would be willing to obtain a sub-contractor to perform said work. In the meantime, Supervisor Pfleging will move forward with acquiring the necessary permit from DEC.

NEW BUSINESS

1. Supervisor Pfleging read the Resolution to renew the Highway Superintendent's authority to participate in on-line bidding as follows:

RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN OF RENSSELAERVILLE TOWN BOARD

WHEREAS, from time-to-time, the Highway Superintendent has requested from the Town Board approval to bid on equipment available in an on-line auction; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has found the auction process to be financially beneficial, allowing the Highway Superintendent to acquire useful equipment at a fraction of the cost of the acquisition of comparable new equipment; and

WHEREAS, Section 142(1) of the Highway Law permits the Town Board to authorize the Highway Superintendent to purchase equipment, tools and other implements to be used for highway maintenance, construction or reconstruction, snow plows or other devices for the removal of snow from the highways from monies appropriated for that purpose without prior approval of the Town Board, and in an amount or amounts to be fixed, from time to time, by the Town Board; and

WHEREAS, the Town board has determined that it is in the public interest to grant the Highway Super-intendent such authority;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the duly convened Town Board of the Town of Rensselaer-ville, Albany County, New York, that (1) the Highway Superintendent is authorized to bid on, and to purchase, equipment, tools and other implements to be used for highway maintenance, construction or reconstruction, snow plows or other devices for the removal of snow from the highways from monies appropriated for that purpose without prior approval of the Town Board, through September 30, 2018, up to an amount of \$10,000; (2) this resolution may be reviewed and re-approved quarterly; (3) the Highway Superintendent shall provide the Town Supervisor prompt notice of any bids and purchases made pursuant to this resolution; and (4) nothing in this resolution is intended to limit the Town Board's authority, by subsequent resolution, to modify or rescind this authority generally or with respect to a particular prospective purchase.

By motion made by John Dolce and seconded by Margaret Sedlmeir, the foregoing resolution was adopted by a majority of the members of the Town Board of the Town of Rensselaerville on the 14th day of June 2018 as follows:

2. Supervisor Pfleging announced that during the recent PERMA conference he and Linda McCormick attended, he learned that the Town will be mandated to provide cancer coverage through NYS Worker's Compensation for members of the Town's fire companies. It is called the New York State Firefighter Cancer Benefit Program and is a New York State, unfunded mandate, which will commence on January 1, 2019. Eligible volunteer firefighters are covered under the NYS Firefighter Cancer Plan provided that

the volunteer has served at least 5 years as an *interior firefighter* as evidenced by passage of the mask fit test which is required of all volunteer firefighters with an interior firefighter rating; and upon entrance into the volunteer service, the volunteer firefighter successfully passed an exam which did not reveal any evidence of cancers. It will cost approximately \$250/qualified firefighter, regardless of whether the 5-year service was forty years ago or 5 years ago – as long as the individual is still an active member.

- 3. Discussion was had regarding the mowing of the parks. Attorney Fallati offered an option that the Board rescind the contract, send a notice of such to the current contractor, and then re-bid the contract. It would be a lengthy process to obtain another contractor, and despite the breach of contract, the Board elected to continue with the current contractor for the remainder of the year.
- 4. Supervisor Pfleging read the resignation letter submitted by Gerritt Platel as Deputy Water/Sewer Operator.

A motion was made by Councilman Rauf to accept the resignation of Deputy Water/Sewer Operator Gerritt Platel; 2nd by Councilman Dolce.

NYS Volunteer Firefighter Gap Coverage Cancer Disability Benefits Act

BILL NO S1411B

PURPOSE: To create the New York State Volunteer Firefighter Gap Coverage Cancer Disability Benefits Act to provide volunteer firefighters who contract certain forms of cancer with enhanced disability benefits.

A volunteer firefighter will be eligible for enhanced cancer disability benefits if the following criteria is met: *The volunteer has served for at least five years as an interior firefighter as evidenced by passage of the mask fit test which is required of all volunteer firefighters with an interior firefighting rating; *Upon entrance into the volunteer service the volunteer firefighter successfully passed a physical examination; and

*The volunteer firefighter has a disease caused by an uncontrolled division of abnormal cells in any part of the body or a malignant growth or tumor affecting the lymphatic or hematological systems or digestive, urinary, prostate, neurological, breast or reproductive systems or melanoma.

A volunteer who meets the eligibility requirements of the bill shall be eligible for the following disability benefits:

*For medically serious forms of cancer the volunteer firefighter will be eligible for a lump sum payment of \$25,000 which may be drawn from a pool of \$50,000 which is available if there is more than one negative diagnosis over the volunteer firefighters' lifetime; *In the case of others medically treatable cancers, a lump sum benefit may be drawn from a pool of \$50,000 which is available if there is more than one negative diagnosis over the volunteer firefighters' lifetime;

*If the volunteer firefighter is totally disabled, a monthly benefit of \$1,500 per month payable up to 36 consecutive monthly payments; and *In case of death, the volunteer firefighters' family will be eligible for an accidental death benefit in the amount of \$50.000.

Allows a legally organized fire department to use proceeds from real property taxes for purposes of providing such disability insurance.

Requires that any fire department whose member has received a disability payment under the provisions of this act shall report such payments to the Office of Fire Prevention and Control. Beginning in January 1, 2020 the Office of Fire Prevention and Control shall report yearly to the legislature the number of firefighters who have received benefits under this act.

Authorizes the Office of Fire Prevention and Control to adopt rules and regulations as are reasonably necessary to implement the provisions of this act.

Section 3. Provides that fund received by the volunteer firefighter as insurance payments for cancer benefits shall not be subject to New York State income taxes.

Section 4. This act shall take effective on January 1, 2019.

EXISTING LAW: Presently, there are no health or disability protections afforded volunteer firefighters outside of what is currently allowed for under the disability provisions in the volunteer firefighters benefit law.

Under the firefighters' benefit law, a totally disabled firefighter is limited to \$600 per month in disability benefits.





MUSEUM PASSES

Check the following passes out with your Library Card. Don't forget to show your card at the Via Aquarium for a \$2.00 Discount.

<u>The Albany Institute of History and Art</u> located on Washington Ave in Albany. The Library offers two museum passes for free admission for a family and a 10% discount at the museum shop. The museum has a number of exhibitions and programs.

The Clark Art Institute in Williamstown, MA. The Library offers a free museum pass for two adult admissions July through October. Opened to the public in 1955, the Clark has become one of the most beloved and respected art museums in the world, known for its intimate galleries and stunning natural environment. It also houses research and academic programs, including a major art history library, and is a leading international center for research and discussion on the nature of art and art history.

<u>Iroquois Indian Museum</u> in Howes Cave on Caverns Rd. The Library offers a museum pass for free admission for two adults and children under 18. The pass provides admission to the museum and the nature trail through the 45 acre Nature Park. The pass can't be used for special events or festivals.

The Old Stone Fort Museum Complex located in Schoharie also houses the Schoharie County Historical Society and Research Library. The Library offers three free museum passes for two adults and two children now through October. Passes can't be used for special events. Visitors learn about the first Dutch and German settlers in the Schoharie Valley and their Indian neighbors. Artifacts date back to the early 1700s.

<u>USS Slater</u> berthed on the Hudson River in Albany. The Library offers a free museum Family Pass for two adults and two children. Open for Tours: April through NovembeR. During World War II, 563 Destroyer Escorts battled Nazi U-boats on the North Atlantic protecting convoys of men and material. In the Pacific they stood in line to defend naval task forces from Japanese submarines and Kamikaze air attacks. The American Legion Clarke White Post #589 provided the support to obtain the pass.







Giant Hogweed - Do Not Touch This Plant!

Giant hogweed (*Heracleum mantegazzianum*) is a Federally listed noxious weed. Its sap, in combination with moisture and sunlight, can cause severe skin and eye irritation, painful blistering, permanent scarring and blindness. Contact between the skin and the sap of this plant occurs either through brushing against the bristles on the stem or breaking the stem or leaves.

What to do if you come in contact with giant hogweed:
Immediately wash the affected area thoroughly with soap
and water and keep the area away from sunlight for 48
hours. This plant poses a serious health threat; see your
physician if you think you have been burned by giant hogweed. If you think you have giant hogweed on your property, do NOT touch it. Please refer to

How do you identify giant hogweed?

Giant hogweed is a biennial or perennial herb in the carrot family (Apiaceae) which can grow to 14 feet or more. Its hollow, ridged stems grow 2-4 inches in diameter and have dark reddish-purple blotches. Its large compound leaves can grow up to 5 feet wide. Its white flower heads can grow up to 2 1/2 feet in diameter. Please refer to the <u>Giant Hogweed Identification</u> page for further help. Some other plants look very similar.

What to do if you see giant hogweed:


Identify: Use the key on our giant hogweed identification page to try and make a positive identification. Other plants that look similar are also shown.

Photograph: Photos are needed to confirm identification. Take high resolution photos of the entire plant, stem, leaves, flowers and seeds, making sure to keep a safe distance.

Report: Email DEC or call the Giant Hogweed Hotline: 1-845-256-3111. Provide photos, detailed directions to the plant infestation and estimate the number of plants.

Control: If giant hogweed is confirmed, DEC will contact the landowner and may visit to assess the site and discuss management options, as resources allow.

Where is giant hogweed found?



Giant hogweed is a native of the Caucasus Mountain region between the Black and Caspian Seas. It was introduced to Europe and the United Kingdom in the late nineteenth century and to the United States in the early twentieth century as an ornamental garden plant. It has become established in New England, the Mid-Atlantic Region and the Northwest. Giant hogweed grows along streams and rivers and in fields, forests, yards and roadsides. It prefers open sites with abundant light and moist soil but it can grow in partially shaded habitats, too. The map to the right displays the current confirmed locations of giant hogweed sites in New York State.

Wild Parsnip

Do Not Touch This Plant!

Wild parsnip (*Pastinaca sativa*) is an invasive plant from Europe and Asia that has become naturalized in North America. It is well suited for colonizing disturbed areas but can also be found in open fields and lawns. Wild parsnip sap can cause painful, localized burning and blistering of the skin. Identification

Wild parsnip can grow up to 5' tall and has hollow, grooved stems that are hairless. Leaves resemble large celery leaves. They are yellow-green, coarsely toothed and compound, with 3-5 leaflets. Small, yellow flowers are clustered together in a flat-topped array approximately 3-8" across. Flowering usually occurs during the second year of growth, starting in May or June and lasting for 1-2 months. Seeds are flat, brown, and slightly winged to facilitate wind dispersal in the fall.

Where is wild parsnip located?

Wild parsnip can be found growing in a broad range of habitats, especially along roadsides, in fields and in pastures. It is common in the United States and Canada and is widespread in New York. DEC encourages the public to report sightings of this invasive plant to <u>iMapInvasives</u> (leaves DEC website).

Why is wild parsnip dangerous?

Wild parsnip sap contains chemicals called furanocoumarins which can make skin more vulnerable to ultraviolet light. Brushing against or breaking the plant releases sap that, combined with sunlight, can cause a severe burn within 24 to 48 hours. This reaction, known as phytophotodermatitis, can also cause discoloration of the skin and increased sensitivity to sunlight that may last for years.

How to protect yourself from wild parsnip:

- Learn to identify wild parsnip at different life stages.
- Do not touch any parts of the plant with bare skin.

Wear gloves, long-sleeved shirts, pants, boots and eye protection if working near wild parsnip to prevent skin contact with the sap. Synthetic, water-resistant materials are recommended.

If contact with sap occurs...

• Wash the affected area thoroughly with soap and water, and keep it covered for at least 48 hours to prevent a reaction.

If a reaction occurs, keep the affected area out of sunlight to prevent further burning or discoloration, and see a physician.

What can be done about wild parsnip?

Prevent establishment and spread

It is important to remove new infestations while they are still small and not well established. When using equipment where wild parsnip is present, make sure to clean it thoroughly before using it again in an area that is parsnip-free. Avoid areas where seed is present to prevent its accidental spread on clothing and equipment.

Control and management

Manual removal of plants can be effective for small areas. Cutting roots 1-2" below the soil or pulling plants by hand should be done before they have gone to seed. If removing plants after seeds have already developed, cut off the seed heads and put them in plastic bags. Leave the bags out in the sun for one week to kill the seed heads before disposal. Mowing wild parsnip after flowers have bloomed but before seeds have developed can kill the plants. Some plants may re-sprout, making it necessary to mow the area again. General herbicides can be applied as spot treatments to new shoots.

Report an infestation

If you believe you have found wild parsnip...

- Take a picture of the entire plant and close-ups of the leaf, flower and/or seed.
- Note the location (intersecting roads, landmarks or GPS coordinates).

Report the infestation to iMapInvasives (leaves DEC website).

The tradition of summer-only services at the Presbyterian Church in Rensselaerville goes back more than 100 years. For a short period in the second half of the 19th century, the village was a lively industrial town as the first site of the Huyck Woolen Mills. When founder and Presbyterian Church member F. C. Huyck Sr. moved his mill to Albany, he did not sever ties with the village or

the church. But as jobs left with the mill so did many of the village residents, leaving the church without enough members to maintain a year-round pastor. However, the Huyck family returned each year to vacation and provided for a pastor during their stay. It was F. C. Huyck Sr.'s granddaughter, Katharine Huyck Elmore, who in the middle of the 20th century expanded the vision of the summer services to other faith traditions and invited ministers, rabbis, priests and nuns to fill the pulpit.

The Rensselaerville Presbyterian Church is a nationally recognized example of Greek Revival architecture dating from the 1840s and is listed on both the National and State Registers of Historic Places.
