The Work Meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Rensselaerville was held on the 7th day of May 2019 at 7:00 in the evening at the Rensselaerville Town Hall, 87 Barger Road, Medusa, NY. The meeting was convened by Supervisor John Dolce and the roll was called with the following results:

PRESENT WERE: Supervisor John Dolce, Councilwoman Marion Cooke, Councilman Jason Rauf, Councilwoman Margaret Sedlmeir, Town Clerk Victoria H. Kraker

ABSENT WAS: Councilman Brian Wood

Also present were Superintendent Randy Bates and two interested citizens.

MINUTES

BUDGET MODIFICATIONS/TRANSFERS: Budget Modifications and Transfers, if any, will be addressed at the Regular Meeting.

REPORTS: The regular reports from the Supervisor, Attorney, Highway Department, Town Clerk, Code Enforcement Officer/Building Inspector, Assessors, Water/Sewer Committee, Recycling Center, and Library will be given at the Regular Meeting on Thursday.

HIGHWAY

- 1. Superintendent Bates reviewed the 2019 Town Highway Agreement and noted that the Town is likely to see a \$35,000 reduction in the Extreme Winter Recovery Program. He also expressed his concern over the fact that this is the last year for the PAVE-NY Program. Between these two programs, the Town would experience an \$80,000 loss in revenue.
- 2. The Town of Broome has done maintenance work on their end of CCC Road despite the fact that it is a State-owned road. The Highway Superintendent of the Town of Broome has been encouraging

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Superintendent Bates to do the same on the Rensselaerville end of the road. Because CCC Road is a State-owned highway, Superintendent Bates noted that the decision to maintain the road would be placed on the Town Board, not the Highway Department. However, the Board will ask Attorney Fallati to draft a letter to the State expressing the Town's concerns over the condition of their road.

OLD BUSINESS

- 1. Councilman Rauf will have an update on the Solar Committee on Thursday.
- 2. Supervisor Dolce has been working closely with Bill Bensen, acting Chairman of the Water & Sewer Committees regarding the Lake Myosotis dam.
- 3. Supervisor Dolce will discuss the Sexual Harassment training with Councilman Wood at the Regular Meeting. ADP can also provide the required training once they are all set up.
- 4. The State auditors are still working at Town Hall.
- 5. There are no updates on the NYS Park Police firing range.
- 6. Discussion was had among the Board members regarding the pros and cons of a Sole Assessor for the Town. The Town also has the option of going to an elected or appointed assessor. It is the consensus of the Board to schedule a Special Meeting for the purpose of discussing this subject more thoroughly.
- 7. Attorney Fallati will be asked to address the issue of the sidewalks on Thursday.

NEW BUSINESS

- 1. Authorization is needed to renew the subscription to the Altamont Enterprise.
- 2. The 2019 Town Highway Agreement will need to be accepted at the Regular Meeting.
- 3. The resignation of Court Clerk Sally Lounsbury will need to be accepted.
- 4. Carolyn Bauer will need to be appointed Court Clerk.
- 5. The Board discussed the mowing/landscaping of Town Hall and the Public Safety Building. The Town has received a quote from MGS Lawn Care & Landscaping, but according to the Town's Procurement Policy, two quotes are required.

AUDIENCE COMMENTS

Marie Dermody expressed her dismay that there are events planned in Town and that no one is voluntarily providing her with the information so that she may publish it in her R'Ville Community Newsletter.

Also present were Highway Superintendent Randy Bates, Code Enforcement Officer/Building Inspector Ed Lawson, Assessor Donna Kropp, Water/Sewer (acting) Chairman Bill Bensen, Recycling Coordinator Jon Whitbeck, Jeanne Strausman representing the Rensselaerville Library and twelve interested citizens.

KENNETH'S ARMY

Claire and Dawn, representatives from Kenneth's Army - Champions for Children announced the 5th Annual Kenneth's Ride. The ride will be held on June 1st at the Berne Town Park. The money raised from the Kenneth's Army Ride provides for a \$1,000 scholarship for a Berne-Knox-Westerlo graduating senior who is pursuing a career in Social Services; they adopt an underprivileged child that would be in Kenneth's grade providing him/her with a year's worth of school supplies and clothing; they adopt an underprivileged family for Thanksgiving supplying them with an entire meal and all the fixings; and they contribute to the Albany County Sheriff's Department's Christmas fund.

Claire and Dawn will have the pleasure of going to the Albany County Court to witness Kenneth's two sisters being adopted by the foster care mother who has taken care of them since Kenneth's death.

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CORRESPONDENCE

Supervisor Dolce received a request from Kathy Hallenbeck to distribute poppies at the Recycling Center on May 22nd and 25th on behalf of the Clark White Unit American Legion Auxiliary. The poppies that are distributed are made by Veterans with assistance from unpaid volunteers. The red poppy has become a nationally recognized symbol of sacrifice worn by Americans since WW1 to honor those who served and died for our country in all wars. 100% of the donations collected directly support the needs of Veterans, military and their families.

A motion was made by Supervisor Dolce to allow Mrs. Hallenbeck to distribute the poppies at the Recycling Center on May 22nd and 25th. The motion was seconded by Councilman Rauf.

REPORTS

SUPERVISOR

- 1. Supervisor Dolce reported that he still has no updates regarding the bill from Cintas.
- 2. Clerk 1/Bookkeeper Linda McCormick has been working with ADP to get the payroll set up.
- 3. Supervisor Dolce received an invoice from the Accountants, but is not completely satisfied with the breakdown.
- 4. Supervisor Dolce thanked Superintendent Bates for his willingness to assume the responsibilities of the maintenance on the Senior Car & Bus.
- 5. The Highway Department's kitchen renovations are complete. The cost of materials totaled \$6,286.34. Members of the Highway crew performed all of the labor, saving the Town thousands of dollars.
- 6. At the June Work Meeting, Supervisor Dolce would like to do a walk-through in an effort to make everyone familiar with the Town's facilities. If time allows, the Board may also take a tour of the Public Safety Building.
- 7. Alarm & Suppression has performed the annual inspection/update of the fire extinguishers.
- 8. Supervisor Dolce is investigating options for a new telephone provider.
- 9. Marshall & Sterling has updated the inventory of the highway equipment. They have also provided a breakdown of the buildings and with the assistance of Assessor Kropp and the Assessor's Office, they will determine if the Town is adequately covered.
- 10. Supervisor Dolce attended a Shared Services meeting in Westerlo. The idea of a shared health insurance program is promising, but preliminary.

A motion was made by Councilman Rauf to accept the Supervisor's report; 2nd by Councilwoman Sedlmeir.

A motion was made by Councilman Rauf to obtain another quote for the mowing of the Public Safety Building and allow the Supervisor to enter into a contract with the lowest quote. Written quotes must be submitted with a Non-Collusive Bidding Certificate. The motion was seconded by Councilwoman Sedlmeir.

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ATTORNEY

1. As the auditors continue their work, Attorney Fallati has confirmed with the Town's insurance company that they will keep the claim open.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

- 1. Superintendent Bates reported that the Highway Department has been busy with grading, adding shale where necessary, ditching, patching and replacing culverts. They have cleaned and stored the snow removal equipment and are prepping the paving equipment for the upcoming season.
- 2. Superintendent Bates predicts the following 2019 Highway work should begin around June 6th.

Town of Rensselaerville 2019 Town Highway Agreement

This agreement made by the Town Highway Superintendent and the undersigned members of the Town Board to be effective as of 5/10/19 through 5/14/20.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 284 of the Highway Law, we agree that monies levied and collected in the Town of Rensselaerville and received from the State of New York as State Aid shall be expended for the repair and improvement of town highways as follows:

General Repairs: The sum of \$185,000.00 shall be set aside to be expended on primary work and general repairs of Town Highways including culverts and bridges having a span of less than five (5) feet.

Permanent Improvements: The sum of \$233,310.95 shall be set aside to be expended on permanent improvements of Town Highways as follows:

- 1. Cheese Hill Road: 2" moto pave with chip seal placed by Peckham Corp.; 18 feet in width beginning at County Route 359 for a distance of 1.0 mile and ending at Travis Hill Road for a cost of \$87,856.00.
- 2. Gifford Hollow Road: 1 1/2" hot mix asphalt placed by Cobleskill Stone Products; 18 feet in width beginning at County Route 6 for a distance of 1.77 miles and ending at the town line for a cost of \$85,570.00.
- 3. Willsey Road: 1 1/4" hot mix asphalt placed by Cobleskill Stone Products; 20 feet in width beginning at County Route 357 for a distance of 2.35 miles and ending at County Route 351 for a cost of \$105,160.00.

End Agreement

Superintendent Bates noted that the projects will exceed the CHIPs funding by about \$45,000 and suggested that the money come from the General Repairs Fund. There is a shortage this year as New York State is no longer funding the Extreme Winter Recovery Program - a reduction of \$35,000. He also noted that next year will be the last year of the PAVE NY Program (a supplemental program for CHIPs funding), reducing the Town's CHIPs funding by an additional \$45,000.

A motion was made by Councilwoman Cooke to approve the 2019 Town Highway Agreement; 2nd by Councilwoman Sedlmeir.

Motion carried: Ayes (5) Dolce, Cooke, Rauf, Sedlmeir and Wood; Nays (0)

3. Superintendent Bates stated that the State took ownership of the CCC Road in the 1930's as part of their reforestation program. CCC Road runs through the Town of Rensselaerville into the Town of Broome and ends at a private residence on a section of the road that is maintained by the Town of

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Broome. The road is in horrible condition due mostly to a logging operation the State performed a few years ago. The homeowner, as well as the Town of Broome, has done some work on the road. The homeowner, the Town of Broome, and others, have asked if the Town of Rensselaerville Highway Department could improve the portion of the road that is within the Town of Rensselaerville. Superintendent Bates cannot make that decision as it is not a Town Highway. Any work would have to be authorized by the Town Board. Superintendent Bates feels that the State should be responsible for the repairs.

Superintendent Bates noted that the main concern is public safety - emergency vehicles being unable to travel across the road. Councilman Rauf suggested sending a letter to the Department of Environmental Conservation expressing the concerns of the Town, the condition of the road, and to formally notify them that the Town would like to see something done. Councilman Wood suggested that all Local, County and State Officials be copied on the letter.

A motion was made by Councilman Rauf to accept the Highway Superintendent's report; 2nd by Councilwoman Sedlmeir.

CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER/BUILDING INSPECTOR

Code Enforcement Officer/Building Inspector Lawson reported for the month of April as follows: one Pool permit for \$50.00; one Home Replacement permit for \$50.00; one Building Repairs permit for \$304.80 and \$70.00 in title searches.

A motion was made by Councilman Wood to accept the Code Enforcement Officer/Building Inspector's report; 2nd by Supervisor Dolce.

ASSESSORS

- 1. Assessor Kropp reported that the 2019 Tentative Roll is complete and notifications of assessment/ exemption changes have been mailed.
- 2. Grievance Day is May 28, 2019 from 3-5 pm and 6-8 pm.
- 3. Assessor Kropp also reported that all three of the Town's current Assessors are in agreement that moving towards a Sole Assessor is in the best interest of the Town. They feel there is a great deal to learn and it is not a good idea to have a new person, potentially, rotating in or out every two years. It takes 3 years to become certified and another 3-4 years to have a good understanding of the position. In addition

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to the many reports that have to be completed for the State, the State has now developed a new software package which will be another new learning curve. The STAR and Enhanced STAR program rules have changed as well. They feel a Sole Assessor would provide for more consistency and professionalism

Assessor Kropp also noted that 95% of the towns in New York have moved away from the elected board of three to a Sole Assessor and that the Sole Assessor does not live in the municipality in which they serve.

Assessor Wank added that it is often the case where a part-time Assessor has another regular, full-time job and cannot be expected to take time off their full-time job to attend continuing education courses.

A motion was made by Councilman Rauf to accept the Assessor's report; 2nd by Councilwoman Sedlmeir.

WATER/SEWER COMMITTEE

Bill Bensen, acting Chairman of the Water & Sewer Committees, is working on getting up to speed on issues facing the District. He announced that at their last meeting he had divided some of the responsibilities up among the members; someone will be handling the finances, another has been given the task of keeping the lines of communication open with the Huyck Preserve; and Mr. Bensen himself is looking into emergency procedures. He is looking at plant maintenance and what small things can be done by Committee members. The most important issue at this point is the dam.

The Committee had begun replacing the hydrant in front of the firehouse, but ran into a leaking culvert. Bob Tanner will be contacting the State Department of Transportation to see if they can fix their culvert but until then, replacement of the hydrant is on hold.

The most important issue at this point is the dam. Discussion ensued over the condition of the dam, the spillway and the repair of the leaking pipe.

Supervisor Dolce thanked Mr. Bensen for the report and his interest in attending the Town Board meetings.

A motion was made by Councilman Rauf to accept the Water & Sewer Committee's report; 2nd by Councilwoman Sedlmeir.

REFUSE/RECYCLING

1. Recycling Coordinator Whitbeck reported the following for the month of April as follows: Rensselaer Iron & Steel: 3.28 tons; City of Albany Landfill: 71.95 tons; Sierra Fibers: 5.16 tons comingled and 6.36 tons old cardboard containers; Oil: 42 gallons; Tires: 18

Recycling Coordinator Whitbeck also announced that he had made the last trip to Rensselaer Iron & Steel and he would be looking for a new vendor to take the metals to. In addition, the Town will now be charged for the cardboard/paper recycles.

- The Library has adjusted their hours in an effort to be more accommodating. The new hours are posted on their website. Magnets with the new hours are also available at the Library.
- On July 9th at 6 pm there will be a presentation on cyber security.
- On July 28th there is a free movie, American Creed.

- 1. Councilman Rauf reported that the Solar Committee has met a few more times. Attorneys Fallati and Ryan will be going over the laws and proofing the draft which the Committee has submitted.
- 2. Councilman Wood will be following through with ADP regarding the sexual harassment training.
- 3. Supervisor Dolce received a courtesy call from Kathleen Martens, counsel for the NYS Parks, notifying the Town that consultants will be out on Right-of-Ways and Public Lands placing monitors which will be collecting/providing current ambient background noise in the community.
- 4. Attorney Fallati has researched the issues which towns face regarding sidewalks. Discussion ensued between Board members and a few members of the audience expressing different thoughts and concerns. Attorney Fallati will take these into account and will draft a Local Law that is tailored to meet the Town's needs and desires.
- 5. The final Annual Update Document has been filed.
- 6. A motion was made by Councilman Rauf to appoint Allyn Wright as the Alternate Planning Board member. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Dolce.

Robocall scams driving you crazy? Here's how to fight back

Here are the FCC's latest tips and tools for fighting back against the scammers ringing you day and night.

How to fight back against robocall scams

- Don't answer your phone if you don't recognize a number even if the number is from your area code or seems close to your own number.
- Tell family members especially the elderly or others who may be vulnerable not to take calls from unfamiliar numbers.
- Don't fall for scams in which the caller claims to represent the government or law enforcement asking you for money.
- If you do need to look into an issue that a suspicious caller has discussed with you, hang up and call the agency or company at a number from a recent bill or legitimate website. Do not call the number the caller used or provided to you.
- If you know a call is fraudulent, do not engage with scam artists in any way. Even pushing a button on your phone to supposedly remove yourself from a call list can provide personal information about your phone and identity.
- Scammers also have found ways to collect information to make them seem legitimate. Be aware and tell your family members that just because a caller knows your name or even personal or financial information does not mean they are legitimate.
- Do not provide financial or personal information to unknown callers, ever.
- Do not let anyone pressure you to pay a debt using a gift card or money order.

Other tools

- √ Wireless carriers have taken <u>big steps</u> recently to address robocalls. Ask your company for their tools and resources for fighting robocalls. Here is where to seek that information from different carriers.
- $\sqrt{}$ Block spam and other unwanted calls with available security software.
- √ US consumers can file a complaint about a robocall scam with the FCC here.
- √ Register for the FCC's Do Not Call list, or verify that you are already registered here.
- $\sqrt{}$ Investigate third-party apps that block robocalls here.
- $\sqrt{}$ Download the full FCC report on robocalls here.
- √ To learn more about robocall issues globally, read this report.

The fight against robocall scams is not futile. In March, the US Federal Trade Commission shut down four separate operations responsible for making billions of robocalls. The robocall operations solicited donations to fake veterans charities, pitched bogus search-engine optimization, and supposedly sold home-security systems, among other scams. In settlements the defendants have agreed to pay more than \$20 million.





The tradition of summer-only services at the Presbyterian Church in Rensselaerville goes back more than 100 years. For a short period in the second half of the 19th century, the village was a lively industrial town as the first site of the Huyck Woolen Mills. When founder and Presbyterian Church member F. C. Huyck Sr. moved his mill to Albany, he did not sever ties with the village or the church. But as jobs left with the mill so did many of the village residents, leaving the church without enough members to maintain a year-round pastor. However, the Huyck family returned each year to vacation and provided for a pastor during their stay. It was F. C. Huyck Sr.'s granddaughter, Katharine Huyck Elmore, who in the middle of the 20th century expanded the vision of the summer services to other faith traditions and invited ministers, rabbis, priests and nuns to fill the pulpit.

The Rensselaerville Presbyterian Church is a nationally recognized example of Greek Revival architecture dating from the 1840s and is listed on both the National and State Registers of Historic Places.
